Editor's Note: In 2003, C.H.I. Overhead Doors marked its 20th year. In this issue, we provide a sketch of the history of this young but growing manufacturer.

## **Milestones**

- 1981 Willis Miller starts Coach House Garages in his garage in rural Arthur, III., producing steel garage doors by combining purchased steel pans and components.
- 1983 Ervin Yoder purchases Coach House Garages and forms Coach House, Inc., maker of C.H.I. Overhead Doors.
- 1985 Door operations move into a new plant next to the original garage location in rural Arthur, III.
- 1986 A small roll former is purchased to produce the new recessed panel 2290 Series door.
- 1987 C.H.I. displays its new recessed panel door at the DODA convention in Nashville, Tenn.
- 1989 The door operations are moved to a larger facility in Arthur
- 1991 Company trucks begin deliveries to a growing distributor base in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Wisconsin, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Michigan, New Jersey, and New York.
- 1993 C.H.I. Overhead Doors is purchased by the Helmuth family of Chesterville, III.
- 1993 C.H.I. produces its first commercial steel door.
- 1995 C.H.I. moves into a new 54,000-sq.-ft. production facility adjacent to the previous plant and introduces its "Lifetime Warranty."
- 1996 A 36,000-sq.-ft. expansion is completed.
- 1997 Kevmar Manufacturing, owned by Willis Miller and family, starts production of stamped metal door parts for C.H.I. Overhead Doors.
- 1997 Another 9,000 sq. ft. are added, and a 10-year warranty is introduced to the commercial line of doors.
- 1997 C.B.M. Plastics, owned by the Helmuth family, begins manufacturing C.H.I.'s vinyl bottom astragal and window frames and inserts.
- The company builds a new 75,000-sq.-ft. plant for sections-only production and introduces Golden Oak residential door. A Ryder service facility is built on-site for the C.H.I. fleet.
- 2000 A new 108,000-sq.-ft. addition is completed, new sandwich doors are introduced, and C.H.I. production facilities are annexed to the city of Arthur.
- 2001 C.H.I. acquires the Trac-Rite rolling steel division of Sun Prairie, Wis., and adds 43,000 sq. ft. for rolling steel door production in Arthur.
- 2001 Torque-Loc Ratchet Spring System starts production. To meet increased orders, 158,000 sq. ft. are added, bringing total area to 483,000 sq. ft.
- 2002 C.H.I. acquires stamping operations of Kevmar Manufacturing, relocating the business to the C.H.I. facility in Arthur. The Carriage House Collection of urethane sandwich doors is introduced.
